


Toilets aren't trash cans!

Follow the **Three "Ps" Rule**, only:











1. **P**ee
 2. **P**oop
 3. Toilet **P**aper
- should go down the toilet!



DO FLUSH
The following can be flushed down the toilet.


Toilet paper

DO NOT FLUSH
The following cannot go in the toilet as they can clog pipes and septic systems.

				
Paper towels	Cigarette butts	Disposable diapers	Wipes (Baby or flushable)	Feminine hygiene products
				
Plastics	Medications	Cotton (Cotton swabs or balls)	Dental floss	Toxic Substances

Dispose these items in the trash.

Of course, follow Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommendations for cleaning surfaces with disinfecting wipes to reduce the spread of COVID-19, but remember—those wipes must go in the garbage. Wipes do not break down in the wastewater system, officials warn, and can cause toilet clogs and untreated sewer backups when they stick to grease in the line or get stuck in smaller pipe joints.

“Flushable” wipes, baby wipes, disinfectant wipes, paper towels, feminine hygiene products, and similar materials, should all go in the regular trash and not be flushed down any toilet, including public toilets.
